The January Park Place Homeowners Association Board of Directors meeting was held at 10:00 AM on January 10th, 2023. Attending were President Kurt Nault, Secretary Dick Krull, Treasurer Keith Heffner and Directors Mike O'Brien and Linda Thatcher. Resident attendees were Dave Daniels, Tom Pensabene, Tom Butts and Jim Rocco.

The December Board minutes were presented and approved 5-0. Board Treasurer Heffner presented the current financial report. After discussion, the Treasurers Report was approved 5-0.

In his report, Board President Nault informed the Board members that there were still questions about the perceived usage of the new golf course gate on Shamrock Court. However, Manager Fulton assured him that it was not in use and said she would follow up again. He then reported that there had been no need, this year, to present a list of resident desired Cap-X expenditures to Sun management.

He had been told that last year's budget was still applicable and most of the funds were to be spent on bulkhead repair. O'Brien suggested that a letter be sent to Sun upper management requesting a formal list of planned Cap-X expenditures and the amounts of same. Nault then reaffirmed a long-standing decision, on the part of the PPHA and management, that items were not to be posted on the glass clubhouse doors.

Under OLD BUSINES, Krull reported that he had received only one Blue Heron award nomination but that could still change before the deadline on the 13th. Nault reported that he had received several queries from individuals wanting to run for a Board of Director position. Those candidates, along with any additional nominees from the floor, will introduce themselves and brief PPHA members as to their background, at the January 24th Nominating Meeting. The four new members will join Heffner, whose term is not expiring, on the new Board. Nault noted that there will be three 2-year terms and one I year term openings. He also noted that we needed an elections committee to manage the elections process.

Krull then presented a planning and production schedule for the 2023 Community Directory. After considerable discussion, deadline dates and assignments were confirmed with distribution planned for, on or about, April 15th. A production quantity of 325 and a \$20.00 charge for non-member directory purchase was approved. The upcoming March 11th Community – Wide Yard Sale was then discussed. Nault will present sign-up deadlines in his February PRESS letter. Finally, It was noted that there had been little discussion, to date, regarding the Christmas Committee and that it was important that it be formed soon.

With regards to NEW BUSINESS, Nault led a brief discussion on the upcoming important resident meetings. He also reminded everyone that the February Annual Meeting would be largely run by the elections

committee and that the newly elected board would meet immediately after that meeting. There was a brief discussion on meeting dates, and it was affirmed that the Nominating and Annual meetings would remain in January and February.

Krull asked the Board if there was any value in him continuing to write the "Did You Know" articles in the PRESS. The Board decided that after seven articles, the purpose had been served and they could be discontinued. Krull then presented ideas, for consideration, regarding greater responsibilities for non-office Board members - especially since such officers, as the President, were heavily burdened in that position. One of the areas of responsibility would be familiarity, a "go-to" source of information, regarding rules, regulations, etc. on PPHA By-Laws, State Statue 723, the Park Place Prospectus, the PPHA Elections process, and similar things that affect PPHA operation. The other position would be one of supervision, liaison, and communication. regarding PPHA function and responsibilities as the yard sale, CARES, the Blue Heron Award program, the community business office and the Christmas Committee. The ideas were well received and discussed with agreement to suggest the incoming Board would consider implementation.

Park Place FMO representative Daniels led COMMITTEE REPORTS noting that the new FMO management company was "up and running" and doing well. Krull reported that the new 12' portable aluminum ramp had been purchased with *CARES* funds. It had been received and was soon to be in use at a resident's home where there was need. Daniels then reported for Block Captain Team Leader Roth that the organization will be offering a presentation by the Sebastian Police recapping area crime statistics current scams and solicitor problems. He also noted that they would be presenting, again, the Dementia program that was so popular last year. Finally, he mentioned that the group was currently planning, already, for the March yard sale in which they play an important part.

The meeting adjourned at 12:11 AM.

Lastly, we are also in the planning stages for our annual Community Wide Park Place Yard Sale. The date for the sale is Saturday, March 11th. The sale will be conducted in much the same manner as in previous years. Additional information and details will be communicated as we move forward. There is one vital action required on your part if you are planning to sell. As a license **must** be obtained from the City of Sebastian for you to sell. There is **no cost to you but you must sign up.** But, as in the past, I will be available to register you to sell, at the clubhouse, on the following dates:

Thursday, Feb. 9th from 9 – 11 AM Monday, Feb. 13th from 1 – 3 PM Wed., Feb. 22nd from 11 AM – 1 PM Wed., March 1st from 12 – 2 PM

FIRE SAFETY FOR OLDER ADULTS Compiled by Dave Daniels For The Block Captain Program

These are safety tips from a fire safety presentation, sponsored by the Block Captain Program, and conducted by Richard Marini, Bureau Chief, and Vanessa Brooks, of the Indian River County Fire Department. This is the final article about points made at the meeting covering fire safety.

FIRE SAFE COOKING: Even though we don't cook with natural gas in Park Place, there are precautions we should always take while cooking:

Be alert, don't cook while sleepy. Even though a fire might not start, you can still get a painful burn while cooking. STAY in the kitchen while frying, grilling, or broiling food. Grease from the food can splatter, get too hot and ignite. Turn pot handles away from the stove's edge to prevent accidental spills and burns on legs and feet. Always check to make sure burners are off when finished cooking. Always have a fire extinguisher handy when cooking, even when grilling outside. It should be rated for A, B, and C fires.

HOME SPACE HEATERS: While we don't have many cold mornings, we do like to have the bathroom warm when getting out of the shower or bath. Portable space heaters can be nice, but they need to be monitored. Turn them off when leaving a room. Don't drape towels or robes over, or near them to get the chill off. Use your clothes dryer instead. Keep things that can burn at least 3 feet away from a heater. NEVER EVER use propane or charcoal heaters inside your home, garage, or shed.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY: All electrical work, except changing light bulbs and smoke alarm batteries, should be performed by a licensed electrician. Only use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture.

Never overload a power strip or extension cord. If the cord feels warm, unplug it and any appliances plugged into it. Consider replacing outlets if plugs do not fit snugly or the outlet does not accept plugs with one blade larger than the other. If a circuit breaker frequently trips, call an electrician to diagnose the problem.

Major appliances should always be plugged into a wall outlet, never an extension cord.

WHAT TO DO IN CASE OF FIRE: Practice how to get out of your home in a hurry. Stay calm when your smoke alarm goes off. Leave your home quickly and call 911. DO NOT go back inside a burning home for anything. Smoke will kill you. If you must escape through smoke, get low and go under the smoke to your way out. Feel the doorknob and crack around a door before opening it. Leave the door closed and use your second way out if you feel any heat. Keep a cell phone in your bedroom at night. If you are trapped in a room, block the vent at the bottom to keep the smoke out. Signal for help with a flashlight or light-colored cloth. Most current cell phones have a flashlight on the back. Find out how to turn it on. Please be aware of fire hazards in your home. Try to reduce them and practice good fire prevention. The best home fire is one that never starts.



HOW TO TRANSFER DATA BEFORE GETTING RID OF YOUR OLD PC OR MAC

Steps to wipe your data. Part I of II

Our laptops and computers are a vital part of modern living whether we like to admit it or not. Both a personal and professional necessity, it's an expense many do not mind investing in especially in time for the new year. If you're lucky enough to be gifted or purchase a brand-new laptop or computer, it's important to think about what to do with the old device. Much like your cellphone, your computer houses a lot of sensitive data including but not limited to browsing history, financial or health records, and sensitive emails. In the throes of getting or receiving a new computer or laptop, it is easy to forget the security protocols in parting ways with the old and setting up the new.

Before you sell, recycle, or donate your old device, follow the steps below to make sure you can safely enjoy your new device without suffering the consequences of potential privacy breaches.

How To Back-Up Old Data: Some users like to start on new equipment with a blank slate, which means manually transferring batches of file folders or individual files to the new device. Others prefer to restore directly from a backup from one of my favorite external hard drives — the My Passport SSD Portable drive, or from online storage like iDrive, Dropbox, or iCloud, to replicate what they had on their old device to their new one. Regardless of your preference, you need to make sure to extract the data from your old computer or laptop so that you can not only safeguard the information you'll need for the future but also use that backup to set up your new device properly. NOTE: The primary source for backups is usually the cloud or an external hard drive.

How To Transfer/Migrate Data To A New Device: After you back up all your data off your older computer or laptop, go ahead and set up your new device as you'd like to use it moving forward. It's best to make sure your data exists in multiple places in case of disk failure or data breach. Most operating systems have a system-specific migration service that is usually complimentary.

Migrating To A New Mac: For most Mac users, you can use *Migration Assistant* to transfer data directly from your old device to your new one or from a backup source. The benefit of using this option is that it allows you to transfer documents, apps, user accounts, and settings from your old Mac to your new Mac.

The step-by-step guide to using Migration Assistant can be found, here: <u>How to Use Migration Assistant for Mac to Mac.</u> Please note that even though you can directly transfer data from the old Mac to the new one, you should still have a full backup of your old device. In case anything should happen to your new device, you'll still have all your data stored somewhere safe.

You can also use the Migration Assistant to **transfer data from a PC to a Mac.** The step-by-step guide to use the Migration Assistant to transfer data from a PC to a Mac can be found, here: <u>How to Use Migration Assistant for PC to Mac</u>

The other option for Mac users is to use **Time Machine**, which is a backup feature that comes with every Mac, to automatically or manually back up your personal data, including apps, music, photos, email, and documents. If you used Time Machine to back up your old Mac, you can open it on your new Mac and use the 'restore from backup' option to set up your new Mac with all the features of the old Mac. THE REST OF THE STORY...

When we left Andrew Canova he was rowing toward Ft. Capron for supplies after his close encounter with a large bear. His last sentence from last month he said he would "conclude this chapter by the recital of something none the less true, but a little more serious. Some of you assumed it was the bear again but no -

"One day in early June I took a stroll out toward the head of the St. Sebastian, which was not more than 2 miles away. I was looking for bee trees and I entered a scope of country that contained but little water. The weather was warm, and I became very thirsty. No water appeared to exist in that region at all, but as I was hurrying back home when my eye fell on a green, grassy spot off to my right and upon closer inspection it turned out to be a small dried-up pond, covered with a rank growth of Maidencane grass and a clump of willow trees in the center. Very naturally the first thing I thought of was water and in I walked. I wore nothing on my feet but a pair of moccasins and should have known better. I had nearly reached the clump of willows, when a blow was struck on my foot that nearly knocked me down. I hastily parted the grass, to get a view of the alligator - for I was sure nothing less could have given such a blow - and was horrified to catch a glimpse of a stump-tailed cotton-mouth snake of immense size. After delivering the blow, he wriggled off through the Maidencane grass so guickly that I could not kill him, but I saw enough to convince me that he was no less than 5 inches in diameter, and a little over 4 feet long. These hideous serpents are as much dreaded as the rattlesnake although their poison doesn't act so quickly.... I rushed out of the grass and ran toward home... there was a sensation like a piece of red-hot iron clinging to my toes, where the fangs had struck. At every step it seemed like a thousand hot needles were piercing my body. Worse, my leg became so stiff and badly swollen that I could not run anymore. Three times I staggered and fell, each time more difficult to regain my feet. With all my power I continued to call for help, but my companion did not hear me until I reached the border of the clearing. He ran out and half carried me to the house.

The poor fellow was almost frantic and knew not what to do. But like a flash of light.... came the recollection of something I heard Dr. Reid of Savannah say about his method of curing snake bites. He made a poultice of raw onions, beaten up fine, and applied it to the wound. I barely succeeded in telling this to Ed Marr, when I went

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into delirium, and did not regain consciousness until the next day, when I was surprised to see the injured limb almost as large as my body. Marr was bending over me and applying a fresh poultice. Faithful fellow! He never closed his eyes once during the night and had renewed the poultice every half hour. Fortunately, we had raised a good crop of onions, and I knew they saved my life.

The swelling subsided very gradually, and it was two weeks before I regained the use of my limbs. Whisky is considered the sovereign remedy for snake bites, but there was not a drop of it within 100 miles of us, and there is no doubt that raw onions, alone, applied in the manner mentioned, will cure any snake bite, if used in

"We staved there until the war broke out between the States, when I left for St. Augustine to join the army. Ed Marr remained in the hut, and the next time I heard from him he had gone on that long, swift journey we all must take, sooner or later. Among all the dear departed friends, there is none who holds a dearer place in my memory than this, my companion of olden time."

If you'd like to read more of this book "Life and Adventures in South Florida" by Andrew Canova, I found a source online to read it. https://archive.org/details/ lifeadventuresin00cano Chapter 6 in the second part of the book details their life in Sebastian on pages 109 through 115. Early chapters contain his adventures in the Third Seminole War, later chapters talk about the region in general, notable characters, Seminoles, the Florida Keys, and reflections on life in Florida. Remember this book contains memories from 1855 through 1885 so he describes the Florida we never knew. It's a fascinating story - I haven't finished it yet but I will! Eileen Derrick



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



I have observed more smiles and lighter hearts during and after the events that I haven't observed in the community for a while. Our world would be a lot better with more Eileens in it.

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


