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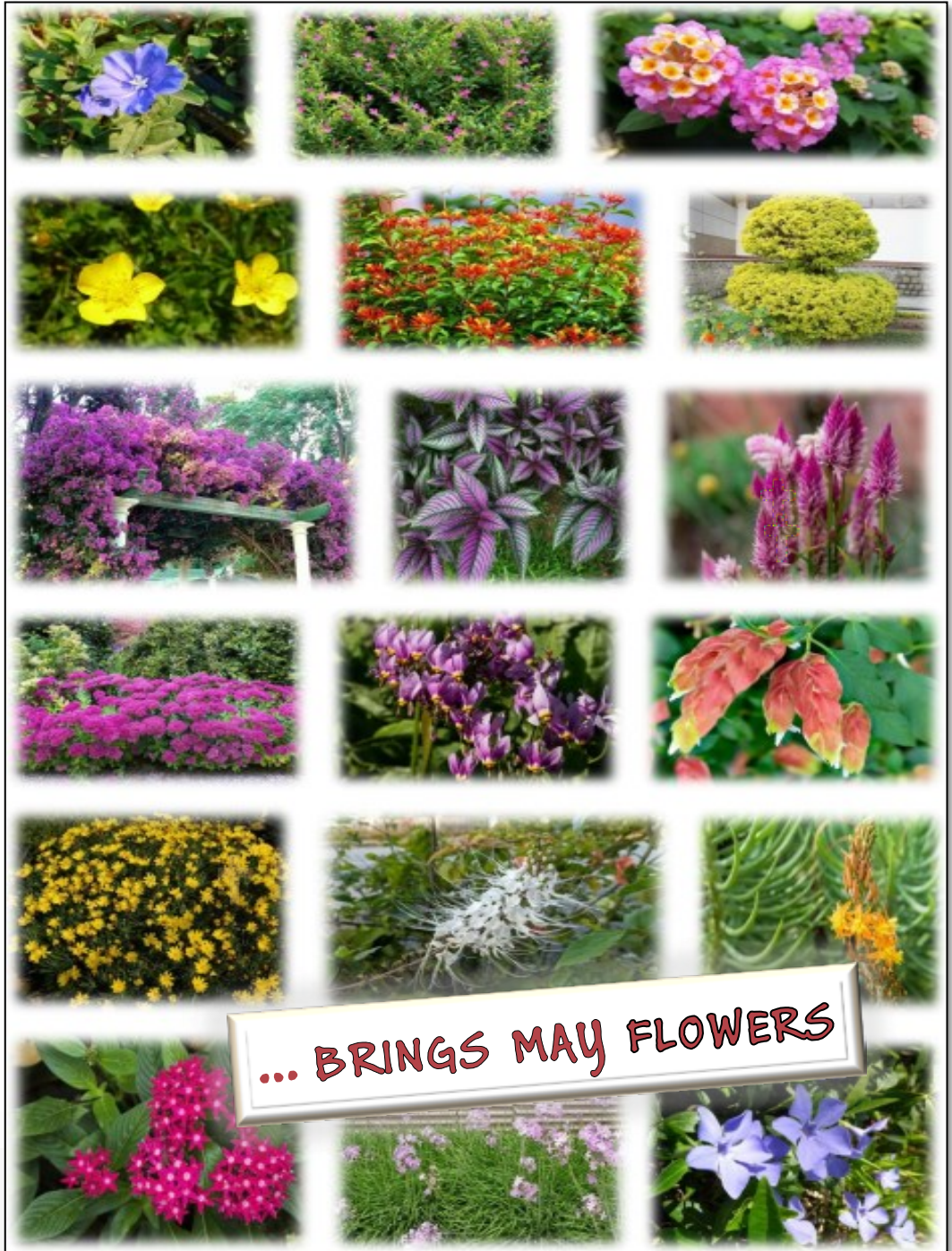

SEBASTIAN POLICE CRIME PRESENTATION

On March 24th Sargent Bill Jersik and Officer Don Hart of the Sebastian Police Department C.O.P.E unit made a presentation to almost 60 Park Place residents. It included a wide range of Florida and Sebastian statistics and provided strong recommendations concerning preventing property crimes. They reported:

Crime is down in Florida and at a 50-year low (2021 data).

Crime volume dropped 8.3%, in 2021, compared to 2020.

Over the same period, murder was down 14% and robbery 17.5%.

Sebastian is one of the safest cities in Florida based on the economic cost of crimes. In Sebastian, the cost of crime was \$264 per person, first among small towns. (2017/ 2018 data). Sebastian has a State Safety Score of 95.3% which ranked among the best.

Along with the data, the officers talked about types of crimes and ways to reduce or prevent their occurrence. They emphasized:

Larceny and burglary are the most common crimes against property. The key lesson is to "Lock your car and your house". Unlocked cars, sheds and garages offer crimes of opportunity. Such can also lead to motor vehicle theft.

Do not leave valuables in your car!

Fraud and scams are extremely prevalent. Remember that our Block Captain program provides regular updates on the latest of these including credit card and identity theft.

Seasonal residents were encouraged to sign up for the SPD "House Watch". This program involved weekly house checks by volunteers driving marked SPD vehicles. Your Block Captain has the sign-up form.

A vigorous question and answer session followed, with the emphasis on locking your car and securing your valuables. Several suggestions were made concerning the benefit of installing motion activated lights under carports and at the front of garages.

Once again, it has been a very busy few weeks since I wrote my last article for the April *PRESS*, and unfortunately, it has not all been good for quite a number of residents. I am sure that by now everyone has heard about vehicles being vandalized, and then, within two weeks, catalytic converters were removed from motorhomes stored in the lot on East Derry. As we have been informed by Tom Butts and the Block Captain team, the best thing we can do is to be sure that our vehicles are locked with all valuables removed. As for the storage area, the PPHA Board has taken the recommendations from affected and concerned residents, the Block Captains, and the Sebastian Police Department and had an initial meeting with Sun Management regarding potential improvements to that area. Gate repairs to the south storage lot on W Lakeview were also addressed and will be worked on as well. More details will follow as we work through this issue.

Also, in our April 11th meeting with Sun management, we covered community improvements, and, after many years of waiting, there will be a new regulation size Bocce court built later this summer! In addition, Sun is working on getting a quote for a sound system for the clubhouse auditoriums. This could be done late in 2023 or be a project for 2024, but either way this is great news for all residents that participate in clubhouse activities. There were also discussions about common property appearance, most especially the perimeter areas, and although there is currently no solid plan to address it, please know that it is on Sun's radar for needing attention.

As a board, we have several items on our plate with one of the most important currently is preparing ourselves for upcoming lot rent negotiations. There is a lot of work involved for us to be effective. Some of that work will involve resident research. So please complete any surveys or questionnaires that you receive. It's vital that we have your thoughts and opinions.

Other exciting news is that the Decorations Committee is up and running under the leadership of Sue Wells. It has met and generated ideas for themes as well as starting a lot of legwork to get this accomplished for all of us. Personally, I cannot wait to see the final display!

Lastly, we completed the new 2023 Community Directory and have distributed them on four different days. We are all glad to hear that it meets, even exceeds your expectations. If there are any errors or omissions, please contact me so that I can make the necessary corrections for next year's edition. Also, if you were not able to pick up a directory on any of those distribution dates, please contact me and I'll work with you to coordinate getting one to you.

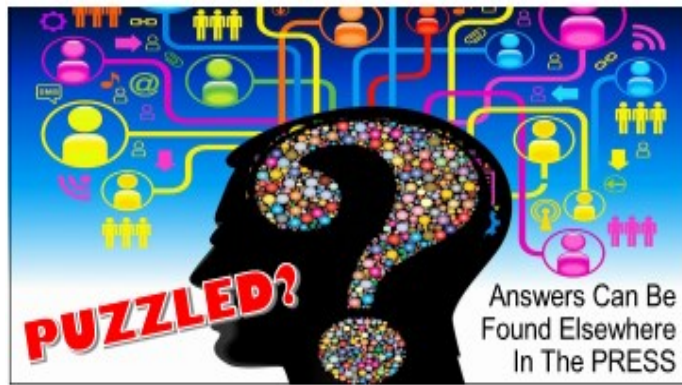

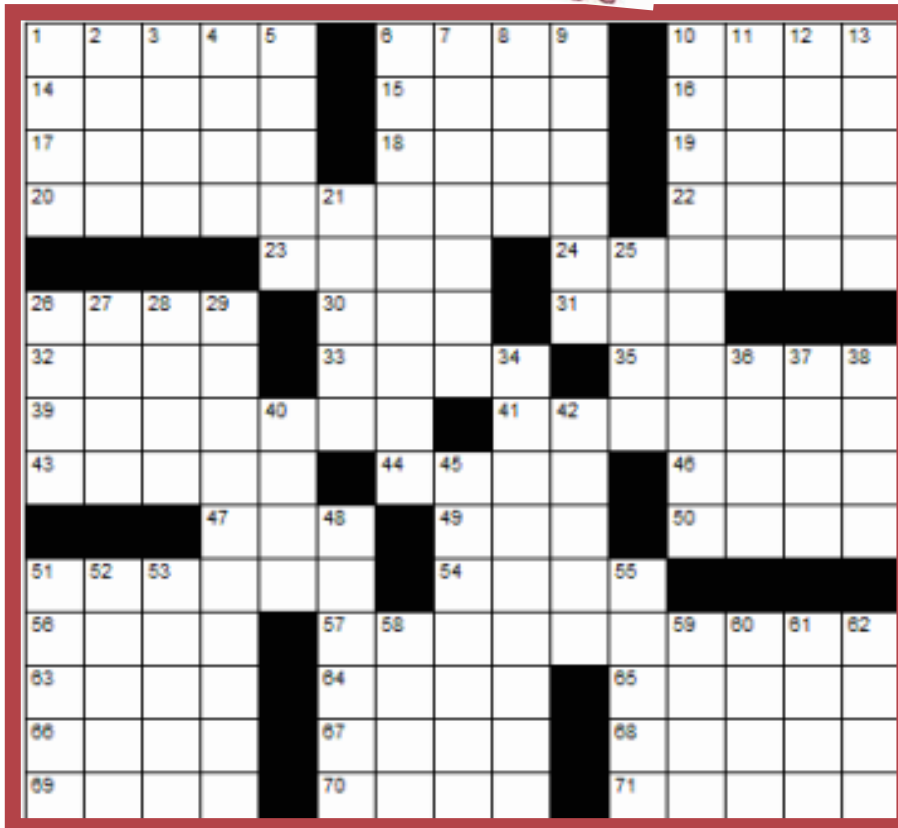

PROS

- Competitive pricing (especially for just one device)
- Offers VPN on some plans
- Norton's Virus Protection Promise guarantees full protection from any viruses or malware or money back.

CONS

- Not as strong protection on iOS devices
- Safe search feature could use improvement
- Only protects 1 device on lowest plan.

COVERAGE

- Norton 360 Deluxe protects up to 5 PCs, Macs, smartphones or tablets
- Available for Mac, Windows, iOS, Android, and for PC Gaming devices

MALWAREBYTES

PROS

- Small-business friendly
- Easy to install
- Offers a Browser Guard which you can download and add to Chrome, Firefox, Edge, or Safari on Mac computers, and blocks trackers while browsing websites

Has a VPN plan available in their higher-tiered plan

CONS

Doesn't offer as many additional features as other Antivirus software. Real-time protection only available in paid-for version and doesn't have as high a performance rating as other programs. I note this because many users flock to the free version of this antivirus program. The item to note per their free download page is "After 14 days, your devices and data will not be protected in real-time." If you're going to protect your devices, you'll want to keep your software up to date looking out for the latest threats. The paid plans are the way to go.

We love to try different restaurants with our neighbors April and Bill and thought it would be fun to share our adventures with you. We plan to review different types of eateries, gourmet, Happy Hours, Early Bird specials, etc. We hope you enjoy joining us on our adventures into the culinary world in and around our "little piece of paradise".



Hi, I'm April, and, with my husband Bill, we've owned our home in Park Place for eleven years. We have a passion for eating out and enjoy trying the large range of eateries our area has to offer. Needless to say, we enjoy sharing our passion with friends and thus was born the "Food Scoop". We hope you'll find our "Scoop" fun and a yummy adventure.

Now on to our first Scoop: THE LAZY TURTLE, 4445 Dixie Highway NE, Palm Bay, FL. We arrived for Happy Hour which is Monday through Thursday, 3:00 to 6:00, offering appetizers and drinks for 25% off. We were greeted immediately and advised the formal dining room was not yet open but there were two more dining options, one with a casual vibe indoors or an outside area, each one with a beautiful bar, ample seating and a gorgeous view of the river!

On to the food: Our waitress, Taylor, approached us immediately and was extremely pleasant and patient as we looked over their extensive menu. Everything sounded delicious and we finally decided on our appetizers; we had *Hurricane Calamari Friti*; flash fried calamari, sliced cherry pepper in spicy volcano aioli for \$17.00 and *Island Coconut Shrimp* in sweet chili sauce for \$18.00. Both above appetizers were delicious and 25% off for Happy Hour.

On to the entrees - our choices: *Lobster Bisque* with Maine lobster meat served on a sourdough roll for \$13.00. This dish was plentiful and very good. *Crispy Shrimp PoBoy* with lettuce, tomato and tartar sauce side of sweet tartar sauce made it a little dry, and the sweet

potato fries were not up to par; this meal was \$19.00. *Jack Daniels Pulled Pork Sandwich* served with sliced pickles and crispy onion fries on top had a generous amount of pork, but a little too much sauce; price was \$17.00. *Mediterranean Seafood Bowl* with lobster, shrimp, jumbo crabmeat, sea scallops, clams and mussels in San Mariano tomato broth was \$32.00. This dish was excellent! *Group-er Fish & Chips* with beer battered grouper, capers, garlic tartar sauce served with regular fries, which were very good, at a price of \$24.00. This meal was excellent!

As a side note, the overall impression of this eatery was impressive. The ample seating, the bars, very clean bathrooms, and the gorgeous views of the river were definitely a great plus. All in all, our opinion was that we would definitely return and collectively gave it a rating of a high 4 on a scale from 1-5.

Hopefully you enjoyed our first Scoop adventure and look forward to many more.

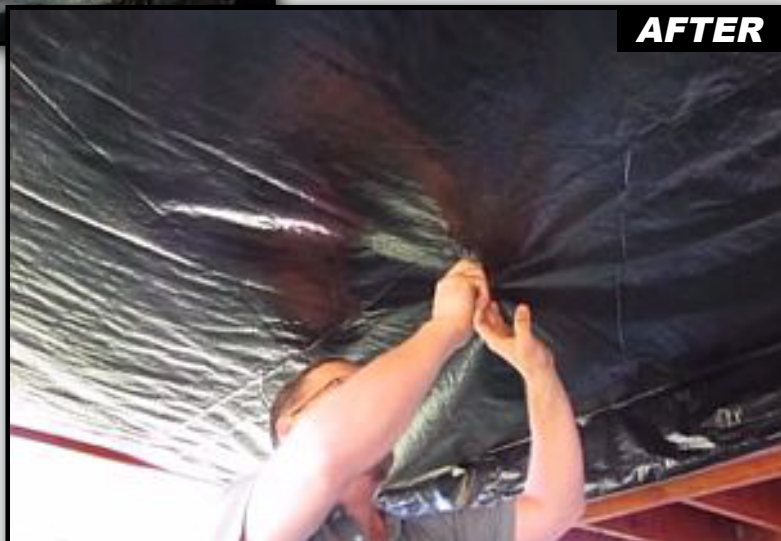
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**Jonathan Dickinson's Journal or
God's Protecting Providence
Being the Narrative of a Journey from Port
Royal Jamaica to Philadelphia
Between August 23, 1696, and April 1, 1697**

More than once I've referenced this Dickinson journal, including his shipwreck on Jupiter Island on the night of September 23/24, 1696, and his time among the local natives until arriving in St. Augustine on November 15th. While his journal continues until his arrival in Philadelphia, I'm focusing on journey of 230 miles to St Augustine. The journal didn't get published until 1699 because there was no printing press in Philadelphia before then!!

Dickinson vividly describes the natives, their habits, social structure, and general way of life while he and his fellow survivors were their captives. As far as I can tell, this is the ONLY first-hand description of these Florida natives who were long gone by 1760 when settlers arrived there. This report of their lives, so near their point of extinction, sheds a little light on their ultimate demise. Although I've never watched the TV show "Naked and Afraid", Dickinson's description of their captivity tells us that show is a very mild in comparison! His party was indeed "stripped as naked as we were born," starved, and constantly threatened. Their hardships were unimaginable to us. Reading it was eye-opening and chilling, so I'll use his own words from his journal. The books are available in the Indian River County library system.

Here's a little background on Jonathan Dickinson who born in 1663 in Port Royal, as the son of a well-to-do Jamaican mercantile family. As a married man of 33, he decided to head for the new prospering community of Philadelphia to open a branch of the family business. He chartered the Barkentine (a schooner with 3+ masts) named Reformation for he, his wife, their 5-month-old son, an older relative, and a Quaker missionary, along with eleven of his slaves. (They included ten Blacks and an "Indian girl" whom I assume was a Florida native, but who died before the shipwreck.) The Captain, Joseph Kinkle, had a crew of eight including two Blacks. Of note was a crew-member, Solomon Cresson whose knowledge of Spanish saved their lives many times during their captivity. Also aboard were 1500 British pounds of merchandise.

Due to the active threat of piracy ships traveled in convoys for protection. Word of a French fleet preying on merchant vessels governed their every move when they left Port Royal on August 23, 1696. They dodged the French fleet for a month until the storm struck about 1 AM on September 24th. By daybreak their vessel was beached, laying on its side. They salvaged some masts for a tent as the deserted beach offered no shelter, built a fire, and salvaged what goods they could from the ship. A couple of hours later along came "two Indian men (being naked except for a small piece of platted work of straws which just hid their private parts and fastened behind with a horsetail in likeness made of a sort of silk grass) from the southward, running fiercely and foaming at the mouth having no weapons except knives.....Their countenance was very furious and bloody. Their hair was tied in a roll behind in which stuck two bones one like a broad arrow, the other a spearhead." The survivors wanted to kill them with their guns. Dickinson persuaded them not to, and "I bethought myself to give them some tobacco and pipes, which they greedily snatched from me, and making a snuffling noise like a wild beast, turned their backs upon us and ran away."

The survivors realized the natives would be back with reinforcements and knew their reputation as the "Cannibals of Florida" who were in awe of the Spanish and hated the English! The group decided to use Solomon Cresson to convince the Indians that the survivors were Spanish when the Indians showed up "in great number" about three hours later. They looted the ship of everything except rum, sugar, molasses, beef, and pork. The survivors were rounded up and the Indians accused them of being "Nickaleer". Although the word was a mystery to them, they soon realized that referred to anyone English. An Indian stood behind each survivor with a knife in their raised arm when, according to Dickinson "They were high in words which we understood not. But on the sudden it pleased the Lord to work wonderfully for our preservation, and instantly all these savage men were struck dumb, and like men amazed the space of a quarter of an hour in which time their countenances fell, and they looked like another people. They quitted their places ... and came among us requiring having all our chests, trunks, and boxes unlocked: which being done they divided all that was in them. ... They went to pulling off our clothes, leaving each of us only a pair of breeches, except my wife and child, Robert Barrow and our master, from whom they took but little THIS DAY." The rest of their clothes were soon stripped off too. Little did the survivors know but the next 2 months would be even worse." Eileen Derrick

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Many thanks to all who attended our Backpack dinner and auction. Special thanks to those who generously donated prizes and, of course, Betsy Kubsch and her kitchen crew; the set-up and tear down crews; the clean-up crew and all our teams who gave so much of their time and talent!! A special shout out to Carol Bennett and her team in charge of centerpieces which helped to provide a visual of our weekly food delivery.

With everyone's help we netted \$4500 for the Food 4 Kids program! Wish we could rest on our laurels until next year but that only covers about half the school year! The monthly food cost averages \$900 - \$1000 for the school year! It seems like a lot until you realize that we provide 35 children +/- with 2 meals per day (breakfast and lunch) x 2 days per weekend x 4 (or sometimes 5 weekends) a month, + Monday holidays that make for a 3-day weekend. That's between over 560-630 meals per month! Also, for the children we need to buy individual serving sizes that do not require refrigeration or minimal heat as some families are un-housed. Our biggest ticket item is shelf-stable milk which costs us \$22 a case of 18 milk cartons. That's half the cost of their meal! Coupons from BJ's catalogs, clipped by park residents and placed in Pigeonhole 385, help bring the bill down. The more coupons we collect means greater savings!
