The PPHA is busy and hard at work on many items. From last month's article, you will remember that we're working on updating our database with your most current information for the publication of the 2024 Community Directory. We are making great progress and intend to have the directory available to you earlier this year. A big shout out to all the Block Captains for taking the time to compile all of this information for us. Watch for details regarding distribution dates. On February 27<sup>th</sup>, we had our Annual Business Meeting. I mention this because, in my February article, I mentioned that we had a lively response for candidates. Unfortunately, that changed, and there ended up being only one candidate. The three current members are now in the process of looking for individuals willing to accept a one-year appointment to the board. I am confident that we will be able to fill these positions in a timely manner, but it does raise a concern for me that I must share with you.

Each year we find fewer candidates interested in filling open-board positions. If this trend continues, next year will be an even bigger challenge. I will not be running for the board next year as I will have completed two terms (4 years), which is the limit as outlined in our By-Laws. Dave Daniels has indicated that he will not be running again at the completion of his two-year term. Lastly, the two appointments to the board are only for one year. This means that next year the PPHA board will have only one current board member and four openings! We all know the phrase "it takes a village", and the PPHA is no different. Over the past few months, we have been making efforts to illustrate just what your PPHA does for you and this community. I would hate to see our community suffer the loss of any of those things if we cannot sustain a viable homeowners association.

I was blessed with the opportunity to work alongside, and be mentored by, previous board members who were extremely knowledgeable with the Florida Statutes, the PPHA By-Laws, and intricately involved with the community as you see it today. This is not doomsday, but I do ask you to think about this going forward. I am asking now for you to start thinking about becoming a candidate for the board next year. Consider attending board meetings to introduce yourself to the process and be mentored much in the way that I was five years ago.

#### TAXATION AND CRYPTOCURRENCY; PART 2

Since 2021, everyone that files a tax return must now check a box in the front top area of Form 1040 or 1040SR either "Yes "or "No" if they "received, sold, exchanged or otherwise disposed of any financial interest in any virtual currency." If you only owned virtual currency, you can check "No". You must check "Yes" if you have "received virtual currency as payment for goods or services, received new virtual currency as a result of mining or staking (more on those terms later), received virtual currency as a result of a hard fork (more later), exchanged virtual currency for property, goods, or services, sold virtual currency, or had any other disposition of a financial interest in virtual currency".

Obviously, there are new terms and concepts involved in cryptocurrency. Congress and the IRS as well as we taxpayers are still trying to unravel the intricacies of this new medium of exchange. They have made some headway. Operation Hidden Treasure was instituted by the IRS in 2017 to try to find the names of people who made money in crypto.

If a taxpayer received virtual currency as compensation for services, he must report that income as W -2 wages on line 1 of the 1040 even if he did not receive a W-2. If a taxpayer sold virtual currency to a customer in a trade or business, he reports it as income on Schedule C-sole proprietor tax return even if he did not receive a 1099. If a taxpayer sold any virtual currency that was held as a capital asset or exchanged it or transferred it, he must use Form 8949 to figure the capital gain or loss and report it on Schedule D just like is done for a stock sale. All crypto is to be valued as its value in U.S. dollars on the day you received it. A 2021 law required brokers to report the sale price and other information on digital asset trades after January 1, 2023. The reporting requirement has been delayed until 2024. A new 1099-DA will start in 2025. This document will report every type of transaction involving Digital Assets not just sales of crypto.

People who experience a decline in the value of their cryptocurrency do not get to write it off as worthless on Schedule D, Capital Gains & Losses. They cannot declare it worthless because the IRS has ruled cryptocurrency is not a security. So the write-off rule for worthless securities isn't available. However, the crypto owner isn't regulated by Wash Sale rules since they only apply to securities. A wash sale is if you buy substantially identical securities up to 30 days before or after a sale, then a taxpayer is not allowed the loss write off.

Some people have tried to donate crypto and take a charitable deduction. The IRS treats virtual currency as property for income tax purposes. Donation of real property over \$5000 requires a written appraisal. It would be difficult to get a firm appraisal because crypto has such a variable value that the IRS denied the deduction.

Next, a hard fork may be taxable. A fork occurs when there is a change to the block chain's underlying protocol. In a hard fork, those software changes result in a complete overhaul that causes a split in the cryptocurrency leading to new crypto. If that new crypto is airdropped (transferred) to you, it means you got new crypto units. Then there is a taxable event resulting in ordinary income. If you don't receive the new crypto in an airdrop, you don't have income. That is called a soft fork.


The tax courts are still trying to clarify positions taxpayers are taking regarding crypto. One issue is the taxation of staking awards. Stakers and miners are people who download software to unlock or solve mathematical problems to unlock keys from wallets. Are these rewards taxed on receipt or disposition?

Congress has been under pressure to create laws for cryptocurrency not only to control it but also to tax it to raise more money for the national debt. It has proposed many bills to impact cryptocurrencies, block chain technology and central bank digital currency. Until Congress actually passes bills, the IRS is issuing guidance in that area. The latest proposal to take effect after January 1, 2025 is that brokers, trading platforms, payment processors and wallet providers must report the sales or exchanges of digital assets on a new form 1099-DA. Brokers would in certain cases have to include gain or loss and basis information on sales after January 1, 2026. Real estate brokers would be required to report all digital assets paid as consideration of real estate purchases after January 1, 2025. They would report the fair market value of the digital assets on a form 1099-S.

The taxation issues are complicated by new terminology and methodology in cryptocurrency. Other issues involve regulations for national security, transparency, fraud, money laundering, terrorism, and other crimes. Are our Congressmen educated enough in technology and finance to adequately deal with the issues of this new means of transactions? Are we?

Hello all! We're back with a local review which we hope you enjoy. This month's choice was Sebastian's Roadside Restaurant located at 10795 US1, Sebastian. This was a deliberated choice, since one of us, who shall remain unnamed, had always heard it referred to as "Roadkill" and that gave them pause! After much cajoling and a little arm twisting, we agreed to give it a try

We arrived at 5:00 to a packed parking lot and there was actually a 20-minute wait. As we entered the restaurant we were charmed by the vibe with antiques, vintage photos, and old advertisements. While being shown to your seat you just kept looking around at all the "neat" stuff placed on walls and in corners.

Once we were seated our waitress, Julia, was at our table promptly and took our drink orders while we were looking over the menu. She returned to take our order but never mentioned the Special for that evening. Roadside has Specials every night, Monday through Saturday, so be sure to ask since they are not listed on the menu and, again, the waitress did not mention them. Every Monday night is German night and Saturday is Polish night - that seems to be the standard.

On to the food; our appetizers were Fried Onion Rings at \$9.99, they were delicious and the batter was light and crispy; next Fried Green Tomato, (don't be fooled by the sound of it there are actually 6-8 generous slices) at 10.99 and was very good.

The entrees: Sockeye Salmon grilled served with two sides, sweet potato and a side salad, the Salmon was good but a little over cooked, the potato was cold, salad was good all at \$19.99; Prime Rib, which was the special for the day, you could choose 6,9 or 12 oz, we chose the 12 oz with side salad and Cole slaw. The prime rib was not tender and a little difficult to cut, the salad and Cole slaw were good all at \$29.99. Next, Tuscan Chicken and Sausage Alfredo, generous portion but rather bland in taste, \$19.99, Crispy Clam Strips, very good but the strips were very small, side Cole slaw and French fries at \$15.99. This was good but not a generous portion of clams. Desserts were key lime pie and white turtle cheesecake, each \$6.99; both were excellent.

After dinner we did take a little tour of the restaurant which has three rooms full of memorabilia. It was all really nostalgic, eclectic and, for that person who shall remain anonymous, there was a sign that said "You kill it, We grill it"! They rest their case....

In all seriousness, we would rate this as a 4 for its unique décor and a 3 for the food. Part of our group has been there many times for lunch and really enjoyed the lunches. They also said German night is very good.





## **BLOCK CAPTAIN** NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

#### WHAT DO BLOCK CAPTAINS DO?

I would guess that all of you have heard of the Block Captain/Neighborhood Watch Program. The question many newer residents may ask is: What are they and what do they do?

What we don't do. We don't ride around in our golf carts looking for bad guys. We don't bother neighbors who want to be left alone. We don't report yards with weeds or dead grass or trees to the Sun Communities office.

What we do. In January, we call or visit the residents in our assigned BC areas (33 at this point) to complete the annual census of residents. This covers a lot of information: who is living at an address, what is their phone number and e-mail address, etc. We ask if they are a permanent resident or a seasonal resident and what make, model and color of car(s) do they have. We don't record license plate numbers. Most importantly we get an emergency contact name and phone num-

All that information is shared in different ways: Names, addresses, phone numbers and e-mails end up in the annual Park Place PPHA Community Directory, published in March. (Free to PPHA members, nonmembers pay \$20.00. Extra copies are \$10.00 each.) Next year, if you don't want to be in the directory, tell your Block Captain and you'll be left out.

The completed form is also shared with the Sebastian Police Department. This is for their use in case of evacuations due to storms or fire damage to a home. or inability to contact the resident at the address. Sun Communities does NOT get a copy of the census form.

The BC Program presents educational programs during the year. During February we presented two programs by the Alzheimer and Parkinson Association of IRC. We are also presenting (conducted by the IRC Fire and Rescue Service) a second class on the proper use of CPR and the AED unit located in the Clubhouse.

In February we had the SPD make a presentation on SCAMS and crime trends in Sebastian. On March 9<sup>th</sup>, the BC's, in cooperation with other resident volunteers, will act as road-guards direct traffic for the Community Annual Yard Sale.


In June there will be a presentation by the Department of Emergency Services of IRC for residents to remind them of the need to be prepared for possible hurricanes. We also urge all residents to get the "Blue Heron" decal and provide it for the rear window of your car. This can help SPD identify and aid drivers easier.

Most importantly as the BC's drive through their areas, we look out for things that don't belong or seem out of place. We are not pests; we won't bother you about the little things. Our concern is the safety of our neighbors. We will NOT approach unwanted solicitors or vendors going door-to-door. We will or you should call the SPD non-emergency number: 772-589-5233,

and report what we see. It is their decision to respond to the call in the manner that they determine best. We might mention if you don't have a house number easily visible from the street or we might let you know if your pole light is burned out, as these are the only "street lights" we have in our community.

## IRC VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SQUAD







One of the many helpful volunteer service organizations available to us is the IRC Volunteer Ambulance Service. It's mission is "To provide free non-emergency transportation for ambulatory and wheelchair passengers from their places of residence to and from medical facilities throughout Indian River County.'

"Door-to-door service is available to anyone in the county simply by calling in advance and making a reservation. Passengers may be ambulatory or in a wheelchair. The Squad does not transport emergency cases."

"The Squad is funded solely by donations, and no fee is charged for any transportation. All drivers are

"The Squad receives no agency or government support for its projects or operating expenses. Its sole source of income is private donations."

In a typical year, the Squad completes over 13,000 trips and covers over 140,000 miles transporting residents to and from their doctor, dentist, eyeglass and other medical visits. It is entering its 58th year of service.

This is a wonderful service staffed by highly trained, wonderful volunteers. I know because I use them!

Then, it will ask you, "Use Face ID, or Touch ID to sign in? Use your face or thumb to finish the Set up.

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#### **More Park Place History**

Every time I sit down to write a column about one subject, I quickly realize explanations are needed here and there to give context to what I'm writing. And the more I try to organize facts into categories, the more little asides keep creeping up. It might seem disjointed, but it is what it is, and I want to record as much history as possible with each column.

One thing new residents might not realize is how often the Park Place sales office has moved in the park's 39 year history. The original Hyatt sales office, according to Pat Moyer, was the home next to her. Pat lived at 3000 Derry and the office was next door at 3002. The home across the street (2126) was supposed to be Hyatt's home. However, Mrs. Hyatt did not want to live in the park, so the home was sold.

I don't know if it was related, but Hyatt "sold" the park in April of 1986, but because he held the mortgage, he took it over again after the Parkhill owners left town, bankrupt, in late 1988. The park continued to grow so Hyatt moved the sales office down to 9605 US 1, circa 1990. Barber Street as we know it today, was called Stratton Avenue and did not reach US 1 so prospective residents had to be taken "up the back way" to see the park. The location was close to where Family Heating and Air Conditioning is located today. The Straton Avenue/Barber Street saga is a story for another day.

In 1994 Hyatt sold Phase 1\*\* of the park to Stanley Garris so Hyatt could concentrate on developing Kelly Drive. Garris was more of an absent owner and Hyatt continued to be involved with park operations. The new sales office was located at the center of the circle at the end of Kelly Drive. It was there when we moved here in 2003 and stayed there until it was severely damaged in Hurricane's Frances and Jean in 2004. There was also damage to the clubhouse and, with the insurance settlement, the Turners (last private owners) renovated the clubhouse and auditorium, and moved the sales office into the clubhouse, leaving less room for things we took for granted. Also gone was the acoustical ceiling and heavy window drapes that helped with the sound in the auditorium, and solar panels for the pool that had been on the roof, as it was now a new metal roof.

The sales office finally moved to its current location 6 or 7 years ago. I'm not sure exactly when it's time for someone else to start keeping track!

\*\*I determined what was the original (oldest) part of the park after conversations with longtime residents and by the location of occupied homes listed in the May 1989 telephone/picture directory. Most of the homes were clustered around the start of E Lakeview, and just past "Turtle Hill", and also on North and West Derry. There were a few outliers on Brigadoon and on East and West Derry, mostly chosen because of the

size or location of the lot. There were also a few vacant sites in that area.

\*\*The 1992 directory showed the E Lakeview and Heather Way Lane filling in, with a few homes now on West Lakeview.

\*\*The 1995-6 directory showed many homes on E Derry, W Lakeview and a few now on Kelly Drive.

\*\*The 212 homesites sold in "Phase 1" include all the Derry and Heather Way Lane properties, E Lakeview to 2052, Brigadoon to 1193 and W Lakeview to 1045. These lots constituted the portion of the park bought by Garris in 1994. All the other properties were developed after that date. Eileen Derrick
